Land Purchase

he Parish Council has just completed the purchase of about 4 acres of land on Costock Road, immediately to the east of Sheep Plank Lane. The land has been derelict for many years. So why did we decide to purchase it?


It is hoped that, in due course, a car park can be constructed at the Costock Road end of the site, to serve the Playing Fields opposite. Many will know that there are significant parking problems, particularly on Sundays during the football season when there may be 8 teams playing at once. It is not yet determined what to do with the rest of the site. One thought is to create a lake adjacent to Kingston Brook, possibly for fishing, and to reinstate an osier (willow) bed around it. That area was the source of much of the willow rods used in basket-making, which was one of the major East Leake industries over a century ago.

So when will all this happen? Well..... it depends on:

- 1. Funding being available to clear and develop the site
- 2. The successful treatment of Japanese Knotweed which infects the middle of the site. This is an invasive weed which cannot successfully be dug out and requires regular chemical treatment over a number of years.

Your input

If you have constructive ideas about how this site could be used to benefit the community, please let the Parish Council know. But remember that most of the site is located in the floodplain and is not suitable for any sort of building.



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Keeping the Place Tidy

e all enjoy seeing the place clean and tidy, whose responsibility is it to mow the grass, get rid of weeds in the

gutters, tidy up flowerbeds etc? The answer is - it depends! Apart from areas that belong to landowners, there are many public spaces and quite a few bits and pieces of what you might call "no man's land" that no-one seems to care for. Some areas are the responsibility of the Parish Council, others the Borough Council or Nottinghamshire County Council. A recent trend is for management companies to take care of communal spaces on new estates rather than one of the councils. So when you think "they" should do something it's not always down to one body. Due to budgetary constraints, the councils only schedule a certain number of visits a vear. and it's inevitable that grass and weeds do not completely respect these timetables! If there are areas of particular concern to you. by all means contact the Parish Office and we'll help you find out who to approach about getting something done.

While we're on the subject though, we would just like to thank all the unsung heroes around the village who mow the grass verge outside their house or adopt some of these spaces and keep them looking cared for. It would be difficult to single anyone out, but there are some stunning examples around the place and we applaud you for the work you do. Of course not everyone can do this, but some can and do, and it really makes a difference and gives pleasure to others.

his year the Parade will be in East Leake. If you live on Main Street and roads off, between Gotham Road in the village centre, up to Station

Road by St Mary's Church, the road will be completely closed to traffic during the Royal British Legion parade and service. No vehicles will be allowed and may instead travel via Castle Hill and Rempstone Road, to the East and South, and Station Road to the West, and Woodgate Road to the South. Gotham Road and Costock Road will not be affected.

Defibrillator



n an emergency would you know where to find a defibrillator in our village?

It would be a good idea if you could go and take a look to see Defibrillator where they are the next time you are in the village.

They are in the following locations: the Fire Station, the Village Hall and the Leisure Centre. Very shortly an additional one will be installed at the Playing Fields on Costock This has been purchased through funding by Councillor Andy Brown our Nottinghamshire County Council representative.

Should you have to use one you should firstly phone 999 and give them your location and a code will be given to open it. The Emergency Services will then send out a paramedic and they would also talk you through what you need to do. Instructions how to use the defibrillator are clearly explained inside the appliance once it has been opened and can also be found on the link below.

t is with deep regret that we have to report the sudden death of Jim Brown in late July. He is now at rest with his family back in Liverpool.

Jim was employed by the Parish and Borough Councils for 14 years as the village litter picker and one could not wish to meet a more conscientious worker. He was out there in all weathers and wouldn't finish early even on Christmas Eve if he had not finished his round. He was certainly the only Parish Council employee who was missed when he was on holiday – people would call in at the office to ask if he was on holiday if they started to notice litter on the recreation ground or village centre.

As mentioned above he hailed from Liverpool and was a fanatic Everton fan, which is why he called everyone "blue". He worked for several years at the Ford Motor Company factory and for a while on Liverpool docks until he made the decision to further his artistic talent and came to Loughborough study art. He joined the College to Nottingham Fine Arts Society and always exhibited at their biannual exhibitions and usually managed to sell some of his exhibits and picked up a number of commissions. His other passion was long distance walking, always spending his holidays in The Lake District.

He did have his little foibles. He would not use a mobile phone (scramble your brain) or eat Indian food, and was a fanatic republican, never having a good word for any member of the Royal Family.

erhaps the least exciting thing the Parish Council has to do each year is to undertake a detailed review of the current year's income and

expenditure and project forward to calculate what we will need in the following year.


Some Councils simply say inflation is 3%, so increase everything by that figure, but this inevitably means that those Councils never do anything new.

We, from day one, have preferred to prepare an Action Plan covering a period of 5 years in which we try to identify and cost the projects that we would like to be able to fulfil and prepare the annual budget accordingly. This has enabled us to extend the Health Centre car park, install the new children's playground, renovate The Glebe and Rest Garden and extend the Council's Works Depot.

The Action Plan is reviewed from time to time and this review has just been completed, with the extension of the Gotham Road car park, the acquisition of land on Costock Road for Playing Fields parking and the installation of fitness equipment in Meadow Park being identified as priority items.

The process will not be full completed until January 2018 when the budget for 2018/19 will be set, but rest assured we will keep you advised of the outcome.

Amenities Update



may have noticed there were extra hanging baskets and flower towers this year, we have replaced/repaired all but one of the fingerposts and a new shelter has been erected in the Rest Garden. Coming soon are some replacement benches (an ongoing project over the next few years) and three new picnic benches have been ordered for the recreation ground together with the planting of two trees to provide shade in the summer.
