and a 'Come and Play Demonstration' from the Nottingham Croquet Club.


We hope everyone had a wonderful time and enjoyed embracing the return to our village centre!

# COSTOCK ROAD DEVELOPMENTS

Some good news and some not-so-good news...

Most of the funding for the new pavilion and refurbishment of the two-storey building is now in place and, if necessary, the Parish Council have agreed to fund the small shortfall. The main contractor and all support staff have been appointed and it is hoped that work will start in November. Temporary arrangements for the players will be put in place. To cover the remainder, it is hoped to receive money from Rushcliffe Borough Council money contributed by developers as Community Infrastructure Levy. The public have a part to play in the fund raising to help fit out the interior of the building - watch out for details of our "buy a brick" scheme and other ways to contribute.

Not such good news about the car park, however, with a further set back in obtaining planning consent. Unfortunately, the Environment Agency have objected on the grounds that the site is within flood plain level 3 and as such there is a severe risk of flooding and danger to users.

We have challenged this finding because the small area of the site that we wish to develop as a car park is within flood plain level 1, which means that there is only minimal risk.





Thanks to you the stall holders and traders who love attending our market and often remark on the warm atmosphere in East Leake and the friendliness of the people. They truly value your custom and

support, especially through one of the toughest years in recent history. The volunteer marshals who readily give up their free time to lend a

hand on market days are a testament to this and a real credit to our village. The ELMA team would like to extend huge thanks to all involved. The next market will be our Christmas Market on the 3rd December which will be advertised very soon!



# TREE WARDEN UPDATE

I'd like to thank the community for the donations that I have received over the summer. The various homegrown trees and donated plant pots have all been really useful for the fledging trees that I have been growing for future planting in the Village.

A special thank you also goes to the children of Brookside Primary School who all planted acorns that are now small oak trees which I'm now taking care of until they are ready to plant (photo right).

I recently met with the 2<sup>nd</sup> East Leake Scout Committee and we have a planting project in the pipeline for the Spring which will be in line with the

The new Castle themed playpark on the Oldershaw trust field over the summer has been a welcome addition to the field. The trees that were planted with the Girl Guides to the rear of the field are flourishing. It's been lovely to see families not only playing on the park but walking around the trees and enjoying the surroundings.

Sadly, it appears some trees were stripped of their bark on Meadow park over the summer. It's important to understand that stripping bark

from a tree branch reduces the tree's ability to protect itself from the environment. The tough outer bark surface protects the tree from diseases, weather, insects, wildlife and pollution damage. It also protects the inner bark layer and the system that transports sugars and growth regulators to all parts of the tree. Please take care of trees and educate those who are not aware of this.

Some planned pruning and tree maintenance has been taking place around the village, and sadly we have lost a few trees as a result, but there are plans to replace those that have been lost.

#### THE FRIENDSHIP GARDEN

The garden opposite the Post Office has been renamed 'The Friendship Garden' and we are planning some exciting changes. We already have a memory tree which was planted last Christmas. This will be lit up again this year and you are invited to add a message on it, in remembrance of a loved one. We will be adding a raised bed which will be filled with appropriate plants to commemorate those affected by Covid and in thanks for NHS staff and keyworkers who kept us all going over the last twenty months. As well as

an entrance archway we will be adding new seating to encourage you to sit and chat with friends, or make new friends. The border along the left hand side will receive an upgrade with the existing plants trimmed and pruned and new plants and shrubs added to provide more colour and year round interest. The right hand side has been cleared and seeds will be sown alongside the fence so we will have a wildflower border next year. All of this will be undertaken by local volunteers with the guidance of the Parish Council grounds staff. ### CONSIDERATE PARKING

At the Parish Council we receive a large amount of complaints regarding parking in and around the village. The majority of these complaints stem from inconsiderate parking such as motorists blocking junctions/ driveways, parking on double yellow lines or obstructing pavement access. Particular problem areas include Costock Road on Sunday mornings and Lantern Lane at school pick up/drop off times. Badly parked vehicles can obstruct the flow of traffic along roads and can increase the risk of injury to pedestrians and other road users. While not necessarily illegal or in contravention of existing Traffic Regulation Orders, this sort of parking can inconvenience other drivers and pedestrians, lead to unnecessary additional on street parking, in some cases be dangerous and if carried out persistently, can lead to disagreements between neighbours.

Pavements are provided and constructed for pedestrian use. Vehicles parked on pavements/junctions and zigzag school markings present a hazard to pedestrians by causing an obstruction, which may result in them having to step off the pavement and onto the highway, thus putting them in danger. This also presents a hazard by restricting the width of a pavement, making it difficult for someone with a pushchair or wheelchair to pass safely - again this person may have to go into the highway to avoid the obstruction. The Parish Council would like to address the issue of anti-social parking and the effect this can have on a community, by requesting that drivers park with consideration at all

times for the safety and wellbeing of others.

The new playground on the Oldershaw Trust land opened in July just in time for the summer holidays and has been busy ever since. The target age range for the equipment is 2 to 6 years old. 


surprises to discover around the edge along with another picnic bench and a brand new mower gate coming soon!
